Young children learning to read need to read to adults and be read to as often as possible. Reading at home is a crucial part of a child's learning experience and reinforces skills and knowledge associated with reading.

Try to create a routine for reading with your child at home. A little every day usually works best. Reading should happen in a relaxed and cosy environment, without any pressure. The quality of the experience is just as important as the quality of the book read. Avoid forcing your child to read. If they are reluctant, try reading to them instead, encouraging them to join in if they want to.

Most children have favourite books they want to read again and again. Reading books they know and love will help children learn to read fluently. This is an important skill for tackling harder texts later on.

Remember to talk to your child about the pictures, characters, themes and storyline as this will help with their comprehension and understanding of the book.

It is really important to encourage thinking skills while reading and this is best done by asking questions. Questions such as: Why do you think...? How can you tell that...? What do you think will happen next...? What would you do if...?

Give children time to recognise and correct their own mistakes while they're reading - it is an important part of learning.

All children learn at different rates and in different ways, even in the same family. Avoid making comparisons between one child and another.

Most importantly always give lots of praise and encouragement to your child as they read.



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It is very important that you continue to read to your children. A bedtime story is invaluable and a wonderful way to introduce your child to the wonderful world of literature.

Important words for your child to learn

Your child will learn to read using a phonetic system, further details of which are available on the curriculum page of the website. In addition to learning phonetically (e.g. certain letters correspond to certain sounds), we also teach the children words that cannot be learnt in this way.

Sight words (also known as common exception words or high frequency words) are words that occur frequently in reading and writing, many of which cannot be sounded out.

Below is a list of the first 100 of these words that we teach; the following page lists the next 200. Your support in helping your child practise these words is invaluable.
