A huge thank you to everyone who attended the MacMillian coffee morning. It was great to meet so many parents and raise a huge amount for such a good cause.



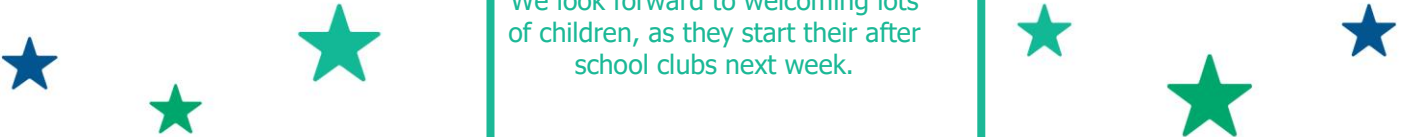
